WELCOME

It's hard to imagine that five years ago, when Project Rozana was an idea without a name, we would influence the discourse between Israelis and Palestinians. Over the course of our history, we challenged the prevailing narrative which held that Israel took a paternalistic approach to the health needs of Palestinians, and that Palestinians begrudgingly accepted help.

Nothing could be further from the truth. Palestinian society is a vibrant place, limited by the funds necessary to build educational and health infrastructure commensurate with the size of the population and its needs, and rich in a desire for learning and willing, for the most part, to accept what Israel has to offer.

Israel, for its part, has invested exponentially in health and education, emerging after 70 years as a global powerhouse in both areas. It believes that training Palestinian healthcare workers is a pre-requisite for building a sustainable civil society, and that encouraging relationships between health professionals will benefit each community's patient cohort.


This was the promise that Project Rozana brought to its launch in 2013. Today, I'm pleased to say that we have reached a point where the programs initiated or supported by us are being implemented. This is a major achievement, not only because Project Rozana is delivering benefits to the most vulnerable children in the region, but it is empowering health workers and educators who are the torch bearers as well as the recipients of our programs.

Funds raised by Project Rozana affiliates in Australia, the United States, Canada and Israel are having a positive and demonstrable impact in East Jerusalem, the West Bank, Gaza, Syria (via the work of Ziv Hospital in Zefat) and among the Kurdish communities of Iraq.

HIGHLIGHTS

PEDIATRIC EMERGENCY MEDICINE WORKSHOP

The Pediatric Emergency Medicine Workshop, with 22 doctors and nurses from Israel, the West Bank, Gaza and Kurdish Iraq was conceived by Dr Saar Hashavya of Hadassah Hospital and developed in consultation with Dr Matthew O'Meara, Dr Arjun Rao and Nurse Educator Jane Cichero of Sydney

Children's Hospital, Randwick, and held at Hadassah Ein Kerem in November, 2017. Its purpose was to provide Israeli, Palestinian and Kurdish medical practitioners and specialists in paediatric emergency medicine with skills and knowledge to treat and care for children directly impacted by illness, trauma and tragedy.

PROJECT ROZANA JOINS ALLMEP

(ALLIANCE FOR MIDDLE EAST PEACE)

In October 2017, PRUSA (on behalf of Project Rozana International) joined the Alliance for Middle East Peace (ALLMEP), an NGO that represents more than 100 organisations dedicated to building trust between Israelis and Palestinians.

Since then we have participated in meetings in Washington and Tel Aviv and, as a result of our membership, have been alerted to funding opportunities from the United States Institute of Peace and

USAID. With special thanks to Kenneth Bob, Chair of PRUSA, we have submitted a proposal on behalf of East Jerusalem NGO, Nasaem Maqdisyah Association, to provide transportation for Palestinians to Israeli hospitals from border crossings on the West Bank, accommodation and psycho-social support for caregivers of children in Israeli hospitals, and medical devices for children when they return home.

The first international mission to Israel and the Palestinian Territories of Project Rozana affiliates from Australia, Canada, the US, and Israel last November, proved to be far more than an exercise in goodwill, it was strategic. The intensive four-day mission was a huge success, fostering dedication and motivation of all board members to both pursue individual projects and work together to achieve our mutual goal of building better understanding between Israelis and Palestinians through health.

A personal highlight for mission delegate and Project Rozana Australia Board member, Dr Jamal Rifi AM, was a meeting at Sheba Medical Center with the protagonists of a documentary, 'Muhi –Generally Temporary', which charts the life of a young Palestinian boy from Gaza who was referred to Sheba as a very small child with a rare, lifethreatening illness.

On his return to Sydney, Dr Rifi organised a special screening of the heartrending documentary in Bankstown. After the screening, which was attended by the Mayor of Canterbury Bankstown, Khal Asfour, Project Rozana President, Ron Finkel, and members of Sydney's Muslim community, Dr Rifi led a discussion about Project Rozana and the

SPEAKERS' TOUR OF NORTH AMERICA

Three prominent medical specialists advancing relations between Israelis and Palestinians, embarked on a seven-city roadshow around the United States and Canada in January-February, 2018. Headlining the tour were Dr Khadra Salami, a paediatric haemato-oncologist and a senior clinician at the Augusta Victoria Hospital in East Jerusalem; Professor Raphael Walden, a Deputy Director General of Sheba Medical Center in Tel Aviv, and the Founder and former President of the Israeli NGO, Physicians for

Human Rights; and Professor Adi Leiba, Head of the Department of Nephrology at the Assuta Hospital Ashdod and a former IDF Head of Medical and Health Operations on the West Bank.

It was an outstanding way for local audiences to hear about the work of Project Rozana from Israeli and Palestinian medical specialists who operate at the coal face, and to engage in conversation with the doctors and Project Rozana leadership regarding their work and their needs.



ROAD TO RECOVERY

Road to Recovery Founder, Yuval Roth



We continue to support the invaluable work of Road to Recovery which offers a free service provided by volunteer drivers who transport Palestinian patients and their caregivers from the West Bank and Gaza border crossings to hospitals in Israel. Funding has been secured to build a cohort of Palestinian volunteers in the West Bank who will transport patients from their homes to the border crossing where they will link with the Road to Recovery Israeli volunteers. A full-time coordinator has been employed in the West Bank through the Hebronbased NGO Green Land Society for Health Development.

GENDER REASSIGNMENT

Following last year's successful gender reassignment surgery of a 15-year-old girl from the West Bank at Hadassah Hospital, with funding supplied by Project Rozana, we have agreed to expand the program in 2018 to treat 10 more children needing a sexual differentiation disorder operation. These operations are not funded or supported by the Palestinian Authority, and no hospitals in the West Bank have the skills to undertake these operations.



FELLOWSHIPS

The first two Palestinian fellowships sponsored by Project Rozana USA were awarded in March this year. Their purpose is to encourage Palestinian physicians to continue their training in a needed sub-specialty at Hadassah Hospital in Jerusalem and Tel Hashomer-Sheba Medical Center near Tel Aviv. The recipients, Dr Mohammed Majed Rabee Skafi from Hebron, will be working in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at Hadassah, and Dr Majed Dabur from Ramallah will be doing her residency in anaesthesiology at Sheba. The fellowships form a key element of Project Rozana's mantra 'train local, stay local' and their training will help strengthen Palestinian healthcare capacity in the West Bank. It will also encourage professional associations with their Israeli colleagues.

BINATIONAL SCHOOL OF PSYCHOTHERAPY

Following the first successful year for the Binational School of Psychotherapy, the anticipated € 500,000 grant from the EU hit a major obstacle because the entity applying for the funds was an Israeli and not a Palestinian NGO. We are anticipating that with the help of our Hebron-based partner, Green Land Society for Health Development, this issue will be overcome and a new submission made and granted.



PEACE IN SIGHT

We are in the second year of the threeyear fundraising campaign to establish an ocular genetic research unit at St John Eye Hospital, East Jerusalem. The unit will train Palestinian opthalmologists to deal with the very high incidence of genetic eye disease within the Palestinian population.

Project Rozana agreed to raise AUD\$50,000 over three years. It raised 20% in 2017 and is committed to making a further significant contribution in 2018.



NEW INITIATIVES

SPONSOR A ROAD TO RECOVERY VOLUNTEER DRIVER

Road to Recovery in Israel currently handles 13,500 transfers of Palestinian patients per annum from Gaza and West Bank checkpoints. The transfers are managed from an active roster of 1,000 volunteers. The organisation is seeking US\$100,000 per annum for its Israel operation over and above the modest sums that it raises from already identified sources. This is

to grow the number of transfers by at least 20% per annum and to put in place the organisational and professional infrastructure to meet the growing demand. Australian, Canadian and American affiliates have agreed to raise a minimum of US\$60,000 in 2018 via an innovative fundraising campaign, 'Adopt a Driver.' Peritoneal Dialysis treatment at home

PERITONEAL DIALYSIS

A proposal has been approved by Project Rozana to train Palestinian health professionals in the provision of peritoneal dialysis. There is an epidemic of diabetes in the Palestinian Territories and peritoneal dialysis, which can be administered at home, would relieve pressure on existing hospital dialysis infrastructure. The Project will be undertaken in conjunction with Assuta Hospital in Ashdod and the Augusta Victoria Hospital in East Jerusalem and with the support of Baxter Corporation (USA) and Teva Pharmaceuticals (Israel)".



2018 AUSTRALIAN SPEAKER'S TOUR & DINNER

An invitation has been extended to Dr Mushira Aboo Dia, Senior Obstetrician / Gynecologist at Hadassah Hospital and Chair of Physicians for Human Rights, Israel.

MORE NEW INITIATIVES

ACRE ARAB WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION – AAWA

One of the key takeaways from the Directors' Mission last November was the potential for engagement with the Israeli Palestinian community in the provision of much-needed psycho-social and cultural-religious support for Palestinian patients and caregivers staying in Israeli hospitals for extended periods.

We will be raising funds to support AAWA's 'Hope, Care and Good Deed' project in the coming year".





PATIENT NAVIGATORS

In the major hospitals visited by the Directors' Mission, medical staff emphasised the importance of trained Arabic-speaking teams – patient navigators – to support the engagement between patients and hospital staff.

We have agreed to cover the salaries of a team of five Arabic-speaking health professionals at Sheba and five at Hadassah. Between them they treat about 75% of Palestinian patients annually in Israeli hospital.

We will be actively fundraising to cover the costs of the patient navigators.
